a, an, and the belong to the group of words called Determiners.

How to use it?

- a- and - an- are indefinite articles. It indicates a general thing, not specific. This information is new, unknown, or introduced for the first time.

E.g. A pen. (We don't know which pen exactly.) There is a diner across the street.

Tip 1. you cannot use - a - with plural nouns

Tip 2. Use - an- with vowels or muted - h -

- the- is a definite article. It indicates something certain or specific. The reader is already aware about this information.

E.g. The diner across the street is good.

- a- and - an-

We use them with nouns to indicate one single person or thing.

E.g. This is a picture of an owl.

-the-

We use it to indicate a certain person or thing.

E.g. Where is the laptop? (my laptop)
